The Miramichi Youth Campus (MYC), formerly the New Brunswick Youth Centre, has been in operation for 25 years and is the only Youth Custody facility in the province. Led by Superintendent Adam Stickle and Deputy Superintendent Brad McFarlane, MYC and its leadership are recognized for their contributions to the advancement and modernization of Youth Justice Services in NB.

Responding to concerns raised by members of the community about waterway safety, a significant recreation and tourist activity in the Kent County region, **Cpl. Ricky LeBlond** played an important role in keeping people safe on the water. Cpl. LeBlond is recognized for his in-depth knowledge of, and efficient response to, his community's needs.

Babineau is recognized as an Expert Witness on matters related to drug trafficking, an expertise that he has developed into a training to build capacity among policing colleagues in the province. Sgt. Babineau was nominated by Paul Lang and the Kent Regional Service Commission for his dedication and proven effectiveness at improving safety in the region.

Brandon Gaynor (left) has served as the Fredericton Police Force's intimate partner violence coordinator since 2017, where he has contributed to improving intimate partner violence prevention, response and intervention in Fredericton across the province. Det./Cst. Gaynor's has built significant relationships with government, community, and policing agencies which have contributed to improving individual and collective responses to intimate partner violence. Det./Cst. Gaynor was nominated by the Crime Prevention and Program Development Branch for his professional dedication, his contributions to saving the lives of New Brunswickers, and his positive, approachable demeanor as he tackles this important work.
